A Rugby player in college, Bob Balk's life changed when he broke his back when falling off a roof when he was 22. After his accident he returned to sports playing wheelchair basketball, and fed his competitive spirit by running 5 and 10 k's, then participating in cross country skiing. After winning several Paralympic medals, Bob turned to the pentathlon in Atlanta in 1996. Several years ago he started bobsledding in Lake Placid, and is currently the World para bobsled champion. Bob displayed many photographs of his accomplishments and travels, which evoked a sense of friendship and fellowship—especially when he was with the Clintons and Al Gore. It is this spirit that he is directing to CNY Rotary when he becomes President this July. He believes that our Clubs should talk to the community about the things that we have done. We should concentrate on projects that benefit the most people by our service. He is planning larger scale service projects that would involve Clubs across the District. One cannot help but be inspired by what Bob has achieved, and we look forward to this spirit in his Presidency. He is a Paralympic "hopeful" for the 2034 Paralympics in Salt Lake City, Utah, an outstanding 40 years after his first Olympic participation. This observer, I wouldn't bet against him!



Bob Balk is a Managing Partner, Pier 70 Ventures. Fund I, the INpact Fund, is focused on investing in impact-driven healthcare innovation. Fund II, The Washington Fund, is an SSBCI sponsored fund with an investment focus in WA state companies working on the future of health and future of mobility.

Bob's corporate career with The Boeing Company began in 1997 where he joined as a business development analyst in the space, communication and defense business. He worked his way up in various business development roles eventually moving into Phantom Works, the advanced technology division of the company as Manager, Global Venture Capital Investments.

Bob lifelong avocation has been in sport. He is a six-time Paralympian and Paralympic medalist, competing in four winter games (cross country skiing)(1994,1998,2002,2006) and two summer games (athletics)(1996,2000). Bob was a national team member with USA Canoe/Kayak 2012-16, competing internationally at the world cup and championship level. He began Para Bobsled in 2021 and quickly became internationally competitive and is the current 2024 world champion, winning world cup titles and setting track records.

Bob has also been very active in various volunteer sports administrative roles with the US Olympic Committee, International Paralympic Committee and International Olympic Committee, primarily advocating on behalf of athletes in the movement. In 2013 he was awarded the Paralympic Order, the highest honor in the Paralympic movement, for his contributions and service to athletes. He currently serves on the executive committee for the United States Olympians and Paralympians Association.

Bob joined Rotary in 2012 as a member of the Moravia Rotary club. He has held various positions in his club. He has recently become involved with district level leadership and is CNY President elect.

Bob has an undergraduate degree in management from the University at Buffalo and an MBA from the University of Rochester with a concentration in Finance, Operations and International Business.

Bob is the proud father of three children: Robert, Jack, and Bebe.

Drug Take Back Event

Cortland County Sheriff Mark Helms, in partnership with the Cortlandville Fire Department, Cincinnatus Fire Department, Marathon Fire Department, and the Marathon Area Volunteer Ambulance Corps (MAVAC), proudly announces the Fall 2024 Drug Take Back Event scheduled for Saturday September 28th, 2024, to be held in three locations:

- Cortlandville Fire Department from 9am noon
- Marathon Village Green/ High School from 9am 11am
- Cincinnatus Fire Department from 9am 11am

This is a drive thru style event to help the public dispose of any unused, unsure, or outdated medications in the easiest and most efficient manner possible, while ensuring these medications are kept out of the hands of youth and are safely disposed of.

Thanks to my friends in the Cortlandville, Cincinnatus, and Marathon Fire Departments, there will once again be annual Drug Take Back Events each year.

For anyone that may not be able to attend the Drug Take Back Events, there are multiple permanent medication disposal kiosks available in Cortland County, some for example are located at our Police Departments in Cortland County:

- Cortland County Sheriff's Office: 54 Greenbush Street, available 24/7
- City of Cortland Police Department: 25 Court Street, available 24/7
- Village of Homer Police Department: 43 James Street, Monday-Friday, 8am-4pm
- SUNY Cortland Police Department (Whitaker Hall): 4 Pashley Drive, available 24/7

These Kiosks can be utilized throughout the year without waiting for a specific drug take back event, ensuring that residents can dispose of medications safely at any time.

Unfortunately, we will be unable to take liquid medications or sharps at this event.
