helped us to better understand **Bridges For Kids**, the YWCA's mentoring program.

Mindy has been in Cortland and with the YWCA for twelve years, and has been in charge of the Bridges program since 2017. Bridges For Kids is for children aged from 5-12 years of age. For 2-3 hours a week, an adult is paired with a child to bond, and to afford the child extra attention. During the pandemic, Bridges For Kids also started a Pen Pal mentoring program. Currently, the program has 28 mentors and 27 Pen Pal mentors. They also have mentors for girl groups.

In Cortland County, 18.2% of its youth live in poverty, with many moire children near the poverty line. New York State is 32nd in the nation in child poverty, In addition, it is estimated that roughly 29% of the youth in Cortland suffer from some type of child abuse. Bridges For Kids helps girls to see different perspectives and backgrounds. It is a safe place for girls to eat lunch and discuss the things that are important to them.

Bridges For Kids has found that girls who meet with mentors are less likely to miss school, to skip class, do drugs, drink alcohol, or suffer from depression.

What do mentors do with kids? Everything and anything! Mainly, they are the extra person for the girl to have in her life.

Another important facet about Bridges that **Mindy** explained to us that helps the whole child are the Family Fun Nights, especially when the kids use the pool in the YWCA or have movies. When you help the family, you help the child.

Mindy told us how we can help Bridges by sponsoring a Family Fun Night, obtain gift certificates for mentors, grocery cards, buy crafts, or donate to the program.
