League of Women Voters


"Your vote is your voice, If you don't vote you're not heard."

The League of Women Voters, a national nonpartisan organization founded in 1920, focuses on informing voters about registering to vote, who can vote, and how they can vote. While non-partisan, the League is political, promoting women's rights and environmental issues nationally and internationally. With observer delegate status at the United Nations, the LWVUS is often asked to provide expert opinion about these issues. Here in Cortland, LWVCC is hard at work informing voters about early voting, mail-in voting, and NY's new Congressional District lines for CD19 and 22, as well as reaching out to young voters and college students to let them know that their votes count. The VOTE411.org website is a national program that provides voters with information about their own ballot. To promote civics, the Cortland League annually sponsors two students to join other students from around NY for "Students" Inside Albany", a program where students travel to Albany, learn about NY State government, and shadow their legislators. The Cortland League recognizes that good governance starts at the local level, so their goal is to collaborate with local groups and build strong community connections. My desire to understand recycling led me to Judith Enck at Beyond Plastics, and after taking a couple of her courses, I became an outspoken advocate and volunteer speaker for the organization.






